SABEW traces its roots back to the late Kit Larson, a former associate editor of the

Virginian-Pilot and Ledger-Star in Norfolk, Va., who in 1961 put together a three-day session that attracted 60 business editors and writers. The success of that seminar resulted in another in 1963. A permanent organization took shape in 1964 when the Society of American Business Writers held its first meeting in New York City.

Today, our more than 3,400 members are editors and reporters from North America and several countries.

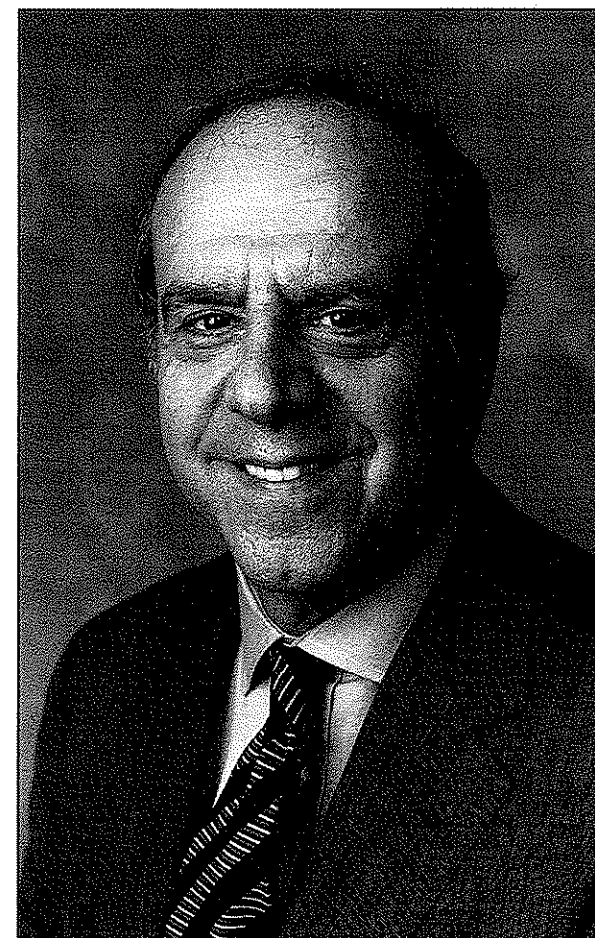

Distinguished *achievement*

Stephen B. Shepard is the founding dean of the new graduate school of journalism at City University of New York. He is best known for his two decades (1984-2005) as editor-in-chief at BusinessWeek magazine. On his watch, BusinessWeek won four National Magazine Awards, 11 Overseas Press Club Awards and four Loeb Awards, and expanded its circulation by 40 percent. He also helped establish the Knight-Bagehot Fellowships in Economic and Business Journalism at Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. He will be honored Sunday night at the Best in Business awards ceremony.



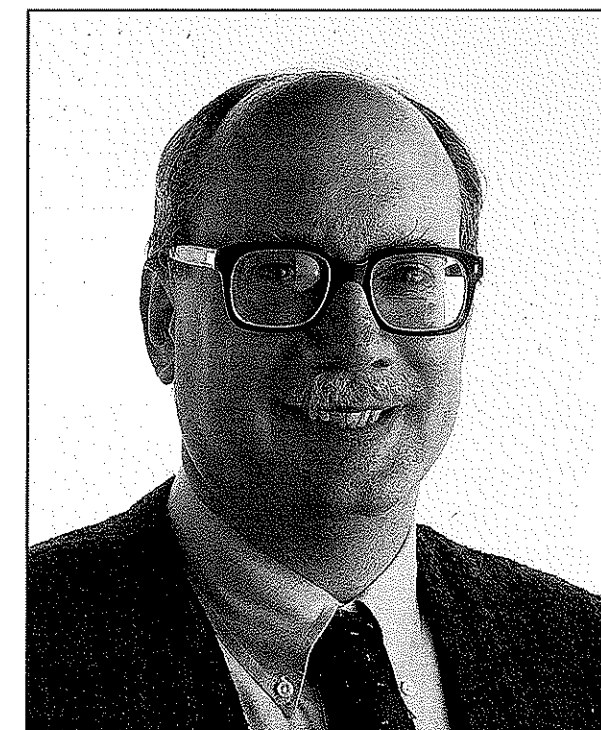

Bill Barnhart, the markets reporter at the Chicago Tribune, has been a quiet yet energetic stalwart of SABEW for nearly 20 years. He edited The Business Journalist from 1991-1998 and served as president of the organization in 2001. When he was president, he led SABEW into the venture with the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association that produced dozens of training sessions for young journalists. This is the third time the Service to SABEW Award has been bestowed. Previous recipients were Doris Barnhart (no relation), who served as administrative assistant of SABEW for 15 years, and Eugene Mills, who as vice president at McGraw-Hill was one of the founders of SABEW and organized the first conference in 1964. Barnhart will be honored during the lunch on Sunday.

CONFERENCE OFFICE: The registration desk in the third-floor Emerald Foyer doubles as the conference office. This is your first stop for information and program updates.

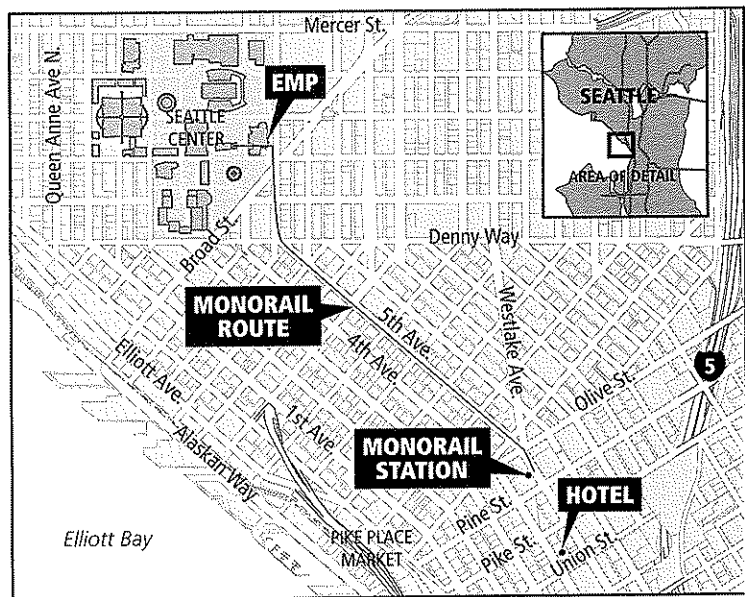
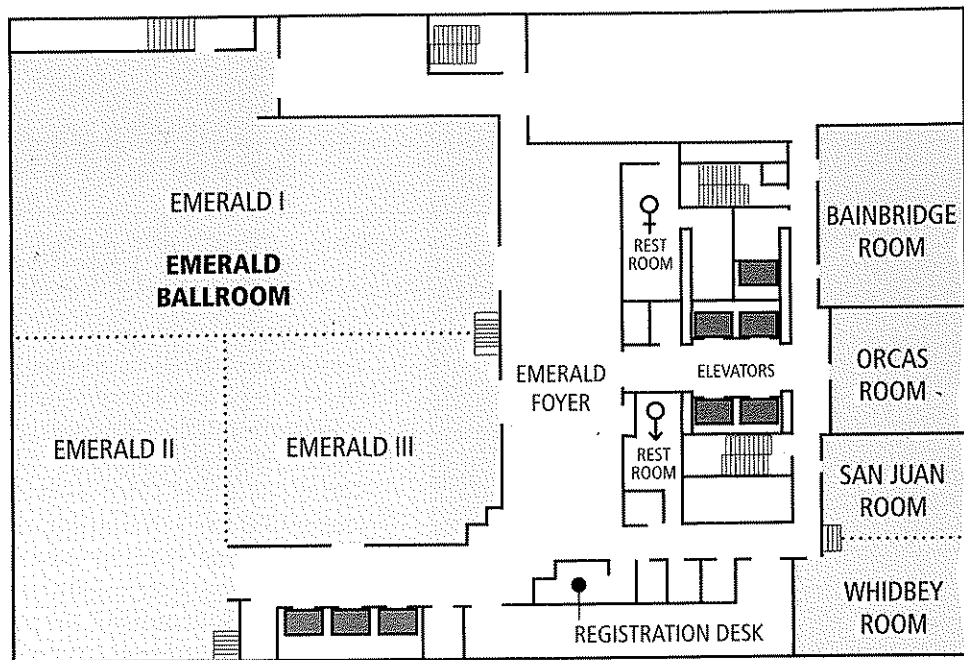

Michael Belkin is a financial and economic forecaster based in Bainbridge Island, Wash. He counsels hedge funds, pension funds, investment banks, mutual funds, institutional money managers and high-net-worth investors throughout North America, Europe and Asia. Belkin's institutional advisory services are furnished via the weekly Belkin Report, which offers strategic forecasts for international stock indexes, industry groups, interest rates, currencies, commodities, emerging markets and economic indicators. Belkin was a vice president in the equity department of Salomon Brothers until 1991. He was quantitative strategist in global macro proprietary trading. He developed and applied innovative statistical forecasting models in a four-man unit that managed the firm's global proprietary trading equity book. Belkin studied finance and statistics at the University of California at Berkeley.
